Exposure to extreme weather – cold, wet, heat and sun.	To Participants and Staff: Hyperthermia, frostbite, circulation problems, heat stroke, sunburn, death.	Daily weather forecast obtained. Kit list sent to all groups in advance, so all participants have suitable footwear, clothing and equipment to match expected conditions. Activity is cancelled if conditions determined to be dangerous or degrade on session. Spare clothing (gloves, hats, coats) carried by instructor. Sun cream if necessary. Extra water, chocolates and snacks carried by instructor. Routes do not take participants up to high attitudes where exposure is greater. And remain within 1.5km from populated area Instructor to carry Group Shelter with them in case weather degrades. Safeguarding concerns from general public	To Participants and Staff: Abduction, exposure to abuse, strong language, violent behaviour.	Safety brief given to all participants about potential dangers once leave Mt Cook Property. Instructors to lead the group away from potentially dangerous individuals if needed and report suspicious behaviour immediately to the police and centre manager. Getting Lost	To Participants: Risk of hyperthermia, abduction, entering out of bounds areas. Death.	Leader has sufficient navigational skills and has experience of walking in location.  Sufficient group leaders to participant ratio  Safety briefing for participants, outlining emergency procedure.  Instructors work phone number given to group leader in case of separation.  Group to only separate if instructor deems there is sufficient navigational experience in sub-groups	Y	Clear brief from Instructor	Activity Staff	LOW

Injury, illness or emergency away from immediate help.	To Participants and staff: Injury made worse by lack of access for emergency services. Potentially death	One leader with each group first aid trained.  Mobile first aid kit on group Group shelter to keep injured person sheltered Information about pre-existing medical conditions and medication to be obtained prior to departure Group Leaders made aware of planned emergency procedures.  Aim for routes that do not take participants more than 1.5km away from populated areas where help can be raised for extended distances.
